

2022 marked 75 years since the inception of Orem Fire Department in 1947. At that time, our Department consisted of 8 volunteer firefighters that operated out of the Stratton House/Orem City Hall, and had one engine.

Today, The City of Orem Fire Department is proudly staffed with 72 combat firefighters who have acquired the most up to date training, skills, and certifications to deliver the optimum level of Fire Operations and Emergency Medical Services available. Ranging in rank from Battalion Chief to our newest Firefighter/EMT recruits, we run a minimum staff of 20 personnel daily. Our paramedic services include several Critical Care Paramedic certified staff. Our Administrative Team is made up of the Fire Chief, Deputy Fire Chief, two Assistant Chiefs, and two Administrative Support personnel. Our Fire and EMS Operations are conducted in four stations within the three cities that we service: Orem, Lindon, and Vineyard. As part of our service, we respond to approximately 7,000 calls per year. As a department, we continually strive to improve our services and meet new benchmarks to continue to Build a Better Orem.

The City of Orem Fire Department fleet is comprised of:

- 4 Ambulances
- 3 Engines
- 2 Type 6 Brush Trucks
- 1 Type 4 Brush Truck
- 1 Ladder Truck
- 1 Tiller

With the support of the Mayor, City Council, and City Administration, Orem Fire Department took delivery of Tiller #33 which is a Tractor-Drawn Aerial (TDA). Tiller #33 took 18 months starting from the first phases of design to its arrival. Several members of Orem Fire Department were involved in the design process, including the Chief and Deputy Chief, members of our ADO Committee, and the Orem City Fleet Manager. Together, the Fire Department and members of Orem City celebrated by holding a traditional push-in ceremony at Station #33 where the Tiller is currently housed.

Additionally, there are four ambulances and two Type 1 Fire Engines on order. The fire department is scheduled to take delivery of these six additional apparatus between now and 2025.



Critical Care Paramedic Squad

Squad 33 was created to fill the growing need for an advanced level of medical care provided to patients on scene. Advanced life saving medicines and medical procedures are becoming increasingly available to the EMS field, positively impacting the outcome of patients in critical care situations. Squad 33 can respond to calls within the response areas to assist crews, mentor personnel, oversee medical calls, and ensure the highest level of first response care is being provided to our citizens. Variances have been written and are currently in the final process of approval for advanced skills and medicine. The squad is equipped with two IV pumps that deliver precision doses of medication. The squad is also equipped with a mechanical ventilator which delivers oxygen to patients that are unable to breath on their own. This helps deliver consistent volumes of air and maintain the highest safety for patients. The squad is also utilized for critical care transfers from one hospital to a higher level of care at another. The ultimate goal for this innovative program is to bring the highest level of Emergency Medical Service to the cities we serve, ultimately giving Orem, Lindon and Vineyard the best emergency care possible.

Tiller / Operator Driver

With the arrival of Tiller #33 came the need for additional positions. A Tractor Drawn Aerial requires two drivers; one to drive the main portion of the apparatus from the cab, and a second driver to control the tractor end of the apparatus. Although the Tiller is much longer than a normal fire engine, this feature enables the Tiller to make much tighter turns and fit into spaces in which an engine or ladder truck wouldn't as easily maneuver. This created the need for a second position within the department, the Tiller Operator. In preparation for the delivery of the Tiller, members of the department received training which was developed by our ADO Committee in conjunction with members from Salt Lake City Fire Department. After training was completed, there was a testing process held and the following were selected for the Tiller Operator positions:

In September 2021, Orem 911 Dispatch and Provo Emergency Communications began discussions on a merger that would result in the creation of Metro Emergency Communications. As part of the transition, Orem 911 Dispatch has been co-located at Provo's Emergency Communications Center since October, and on December 25th, Orem employees officially became Provo employees. With the merger now complete, Metro Emergency Communications is staffed with 34 full-time employees and 9 part-time employees though there are still open positions. A board of representatives from both cities will oversee the new center to ensure that this merger represents equal service and interests. Metro Emergency Communications is also working closely with its police and fire partners to implement new technology to better improve its services. This includes the coming additions of automatic fire paging and cognitive criteria-based guide card systems. This investment in new technology will help Metro Emergency Communications provide faster and more efficient services to the communities it serves.

This historic move marked a big win for both cities, bringing together two well-established agencies into one unified entity. The merger aimed to improve response times, increase efficiency, and provide better service to the communities they serve. The new name, Metro Emergency Communications, reflects the expanded coverage area and the enhanced capabilities made possible by the coming together of these two agencies.





The Orem Fire Department - Fire Prevention Bureau is crucial to ensuring public safety. We play a vital role in preventing fires from happening in the first place by conducting regular inspections, educating the public about fire safety and reviewing construction plans to ensure new buildings will be built to the highest safety standards. Through proactive measures such as fire code enforcement, installation of smoke detectors, and fire drill simulations, the fire prevention bureau can help reduce the number of fire incidents and save lives. Additionally, we provide expert advice and guidance on fire safety practices, such as evacuation plans and emergency preparedness, to both homes and businesses.

Furthermore, the fire prevention bureau also plays a key role in investigating the cause of fires and determining if any code violations or criminal activities were involved. This information can be used to develop better fire prevention strategies and improve public safety. We help ensure a comprehensive and coordinated approach to fire safety, making communities safer and more prepared for the unexpected.

Utah County EOC and S&R Exercise - September 2022

Utah County Emergency Management put on an exercise up Payson Canyon. The exercise started on a Thursday and ended on a Monday. During this exercise EOC operations were tested, Utah County S&R operations were tested, and a portion of the Utah County emergency equipment was also tested. It was a very well done exercise and included lots of learning and experience for emergency management, first responders, search and rescue, and volunteers.

During the exercise, the emergency management group set up in the Alaska structures and ran a full emergency operations center to support the search and rescue team and the first responders in the field. It was a great experience and I learned a lot. The equipment that was set up provided the group with a mini city. There was Alaska structures, tents, an AT&T Firstnet cellular tower, a starlink satellite for data, HVAC systems, generators, and all the office equipment needed to run an effective EOC. It was awesome.

A large portion of the equipment was transported to the campground in conex boxes, via Blackhawk helicopters, flown by the National Guard. This process was awesome to see! Plus the Blackhawk ride was pretty sweet!



Everbridge - September 2022

Orem City has integrated our Everbridge, emergency alerts system, with Utah County. The look and function will be the same, but this transition needed to be made so all of our Orem residents could continue to be reached on the Everbridge, shared county system now that the Orem and Provo dispatch centers have combined to make Metro dispatch. This transition took a couple of months to complete.

Wildland Fire Response Team

Orem's Wildland team consists of 12 members, two of which have gained their engine boss certification. These members have received advanced training and are available not only for fire response within the cities that we protect but for deployment throughout the United States.

In 2022 crew members spent 48 days on deployments in Arizona and Idaho. During these deployments they gained experience in different tactics and operations that they have been able to bring back to better the department's response to emergencies within our boundaries.

Crew members also completed several mitigation projects for Orem, Lindon, and Vineyard which included removing overgrowth and brush.

Wildland Deployment Revenue

Our Wildland Fire Response Team can be deployed to a Wildfire through two different methods. The first is through local mutual aid agreements where we have the opportunity to aid neighboring counties throughout the state. These deployments allow for our response team to gain experience in service to our local agencies when support is needed. The next is through the EMAC (Emergency Management Assistance Compact) agreement through FEMA. This interstate mutual aid agreement enables states to share resources during disasters. In addition, each firefighter's time in service can be billed and revenues are brought back to the City of Orem Fire Department. The revenue is used to strengthen the wildland training program by providing resources and equipment. In 2022, the total revenue brought back to the City of Orem Fire Department between the three deployments was \$156,988.

This year, Captain Cameron Monahan applied for and was awarded the Fire Officer Designation. In 2011, the International Association of Fire Chiefs released the 2nd Edition of the Officer Development Handbook (ODH). Four levels of career development are delineated in the ODH based on specific duties at each level. Certification as a Fire Officer shows that a person has met the minimum standard as set by the NFPA, while the ODH lays out a more optimum standard reflecting a more holistic view of how a person has prepared to become an officer. The Utah Fire Officer Designation Program (UFODP) uses the ODH as a basis to recognize firefighters or company officers' personal achievement through the following four areas:

- training
- education
- certification
- experience

This recognition program for Utah fire professionals provides a coherent and attainable guide to career advancement. The idea behind the UFODP is that a person's ability to perform well as an officer depends on more than a test; capability is built by years of varied and quantifiable learning and growing experiences.

We congratulate Captain Moahan for his hard work and honorable accomplishment.

Orem Fire Department held two recruit academies in 2022 to support training for a total of 14 new hires. These recruit camps were successfully carried out by the training cadre, made up of several Captains, members of the ADO Committee, and other members of the department. A special thanks to Captain Monahan and Engineer Boehner for the rollout of the Truck and Engine Manuals which played a big part in the recruit training. We are excited to have these new firefighters and wish them a long and healthy career with the City of Orem Fire Department.

The City of Orem Fire Department invests in each employee by offering training opportunities when possible, allowing for the growth and development of our employees. We strive to ensure the knowledge, skills, and ability of each of our Firefighter and EMS personnel is top notch. In turn, the citizens of Orem, Lindon, and Vineyard receive the best possible care and service. This year, Critical Care Paramedic Michael Hickman became the first Utah Firefighter to successfully complete the Georgia Smoke Diver training held in Dalton, GA - acquiring the title of Utah Smoke Diver #1. This rigorous training has been referred to as the ultimate firefighter bootcamp, with a success rate of only 50%.





Throughout the year, Orem Fire Department participated in several community events for Orem, Lindon and Vineyard. Participation in these events offers community members the opportunity to visit with our Fire & EMS personnel, ask questions, get a closer look at Fire & EMS apparatus, and learn more about the Fire Service in general. In October, we hold a Fire Safety Night in Conjunction with the National Fire Safety Week, where participants learn through demonstration and some hands-on events a little more about Fire Prevention and Fire Safety.
