In 2015, you'll be voting on THREE city council seats. Local elections are where the "rubber meets the road" and residents have the power to make a real difference. While local elections don't receive the press coverage that federal races do, the results will impact your daily life in very real ways.

Orem doesn't just need informed and engaged voters, Orem needs dedicated residents willing to serve. Wha are the requirements to run for city office?

- Must be registered as an Orem voter
- Have lived in Orem or a recent annexation area for 12 consecutive months immediately preceding the date of the election
- Any mentally incompetent person, any person convicted of a felony, or any person convicted of treason or crime against the elective franchise may not hold office in this state until the right to vote or hold elective office is restored as provided by statute (see sections 20A-2-101.3 or 20A-2-101.5)

It Kappened in Orem - 2014

MIDTOWN VILLAGE

After many years of blight, Midtown Village, now Midtown 360, has found new life. The Ritchie Group has purchased the project and plans to complete the two buildings within the next 18 months. Midtown 360 will include retail, residential, and office space. This is great news for the entire community as Orem's infamous eyesore transforms into a city jewel.



■ UNIVERSITY PLACE CDA

Woodbury Corporation has committed to invest more than \$500 million into the University Mall area to create University Place. This new development will include class A office space and will house more than 2,500 jobs, an upscale hotel, a community park, more restaurants and retail, an expanded movie theater, new housing, and much more. The City of Orem, along with the other taxing entities, have agreed to rebate some of the new property tax for a period of time to ensure this investment happens in Orem.



STATE STREET

Orem has partnered with UDOT, UTA, Provo City, the community, and others to help shape the future of State Street. A study will be conducted to address issues like transportation, land use, economic development, and beautification. The city also released vintage footage of State Street from 1947 and 1966 which has been viewed over 25,000 times on YouTube.

During the Summer, the Fitness Center completed construction on the indoor leisure pool complete with waterslides, a lazy river, a water playground, and more. The project was completely paid for using CARE funds. The new leisure pool is just another reason Orem is your place to play.



In July, the Orem City Council decided not to continue to explore a public-private partnership with Macquarie Capital, an Austrailian-based investment firm. The plan would have connected every home and business to the fiber network and turned this service into a utility with a monthly fee. The city continues to work with the other UTOPIA cities to find a solution to make the network a success.
